# Deafblindness...

**is a unique dual disability that affects an estimated 500,000 children and adults in India.**

It combines both vision and hearing impairments, making communication, learning and mobility extremely challenging.

My parents had never heard of deafblindness either.

Like many children with deafblindness, I couldn't express even my simplest needs — hunger, thirst, pain or joy. They tried their best, but without knowing how to reach me, I grew up in silence and isolation... until I became part of **Sense International India**.

# The First Years

The first few years of my life were filled with confusion and silence. I couldn't see, hear or express myself — and my parents didn't know how to connect with me. Each day felt like a battle against alienation and poverty. They loved me deeply but had lost hope. They say early support can change everything. I wish I had received it sooner — because I've seen how it transforms lives today.

That's why Sense India focuses so strongly on **Early Intervention** — supporting children from birth to six years. Through early screening and personalised plans, specialists help children with deafblindness communicate, move and connect with their families. I wasn't identified this early, but I've seen how timely support can change everything.

# Growing Up with Sense

I was eight when Sense India found me through a survey — and that's when my journey truly began. In 2009, I was enrolled in Sense India's programme, where a team of specialists — a psychologist, physiotherapist and special educators — designed an individualised plan just for me. At first, my family was hesitant, unsure of what to expect. But as they began to see my progress, their faith grew. I learned to read, write, use sign language and take care of myself — and soon, I was attending a mainstream school. Today, I've completed my schooling with good marks — something my parents once thought was impossible.

In Sense India's **Centres**, children with deafblindness aged 6 to 14 years learn through an individualised education plan — designed from detailed assessments to meet each child's unique needs and abilities. The focus is on helping every child communicate, learn and participate in school and community life.

# Learned to Earn

As I grew older, alongside my studies, my teachers began training me in vocational skills based on my interests. I loved sewing, art and craft — and soon learned not just the skills themselves, but also how to manage money and complete tasks independently. Learning a vocation gave me more than just skills — it gave me confidence and self-reliance.

Sense India ensures that every young adult like me is trained in **Vocational skills** that truly match our abilities and interests. Before the training begins, they also study local employment opportunities, so the skills we learn can lead to real income and independence.

# Economic Independence

With the skills I learned, Sense India helped me take the next big step — starting my own ironing business. Today, it's the main source of income for my family. I earn around ₹500–600 every day and it feels incredible to contribute, not just depend.

Knowing that training alone isn't enough. Sense India turn skills of individuals with deafblindness into real **Income Generation Activities**. They support us in setting up small enterprises or finding suitable jobs, so that we can work with dignity and independence. Many of us run our own micro-businesses with the support of our families — just like I do.

# Together, We Learn and Lead

When I learned my first sign, I realised that learning isn't just for us — it's for everyone around us. My mother learned to sign through Sense India's training. Both my parents attended sessions to understand my needs and provide the right care. My educators also kept learning — attending regular training programmes to update their skills and explore new ideas and approaches being used around the world.

Sense India believes that true inclusion happens only when parents, teachers and professionals are enabled with the right knowledge and skills. Their **trainings** ensure that children and adults with deafblindness, like me, can reach their full potential.

# Broaching a Taboo

As I grew older, I began to notice changes in my body — but I didn't understand what was happening. It was equally hard for my parents and teachers to explain these things to me. Fortunately, I had the chance to attend one of the first trainings on **Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR)** organised by Sense India, along with my mother and educator. Those sessions helped us talk openly and understand that these conversations aren't shameful — they're essential.

Sense India has now made **SRHR** a part of all its training programmes for adults with deafblindness. The goal is to break barriers and provide clear, accessible information to individuals, parents and caregivers — encouraging confidence, safety and healthy behaviour.

# A Community of Support

As I discovered more about the world around me, I began meeting others like me — individuals with deafblindness who faced the same struggles and shared the same dreams. For the first time, I realised I wasn't alone. Sharing our stories gave me strength and confidence. Because deafblindness is rare, Sense India built a national network that connects people like us, our parents and our educators. I'm part of the Udaan Network and my parents are active members of Prayaas. They've met many other parents who understand their fears, hopes and milestones — and that sense of belonging means everything.

These **networks** — Udaan (adults with deafblindness), Prayaas (parents) and Abhi-Prerna (special educators) — are like extended families. We share experiences, celebrate small victories and support each other through challenges. Today, Sense India also supports 27 local networks across 15 states of India.

# Mental Health in Action

The pandemic hit us hard. For many of us with deafblindness, touch is our main way of communicating and learning — and suddenly, even that was taken away. I couldn't meet my teachers, my friends or my customers. My ironing business stopped and with it, my independence. It was a very difficult time for me and for so many others like me.

A survey by Sense India found that 82% of adults with deafblindness showed signs of depression after COVID. So they acted — launching the first-ever Mental Health Initiative for children and young adults with deafblindness. The programme provides assessment, individualised support and counselling to help us cope emotionally and rebuild our confidence.

# Advocating for Inclusion

As a Udaan member, I've had the chance to be part of meetings with government officials in Hazaribag — raising awareness about deafblindness and the rights of people like me. We've spoken about important issues like proper disability certification, fair pensions, inclusion in the National Census, access to election and UDID cards, voting rights and the need for inclusive education for children with deafblindness. Every meeting reminds me that change begins when we speak — and when others finally listen.

Beyond our local efforts, Sense India continues to advocate on national and global platforms. Today, the organisation is a proud member of the International Communication Rights Alliance (ICRA), advocating for the communication rights of persons with deafblindness and is also part of a committee working to include a formal definition of deafblindness in the World Health Organisation (WHO) International Classification of Functioning, Disability and Health — ensuring global recognition and inclusion.

# Our Champions

One of the exciting event was our annual event, **Messengers on Cycles** in Ahmedabad, where over 800 champions, including persons with disabilities, families, volunteers and corporate teams, took part in a 15 km cycle ride and 5 km walk. The vibrant streets of the city came alive with colour, energy and hope — all celebrating the strength and resilience of individuals with deafblindness.

And then came **Pedals4Cause** — a powerful journey of four passionate cyclists, Akriti, Saiprasad, Shivanand and Suyash, who rode all the way from Mumbai to Ahmedabad. Every kilometre they covered carried a message of awareness, inclusion and support for children and adults with deafblindness.



With incredible support from Light & Wonder, 55 game changers ran for Sense India at the **TCS World 10K Bengaluru**, raising vital funds for education and rehabilitation of children with deafblindness.

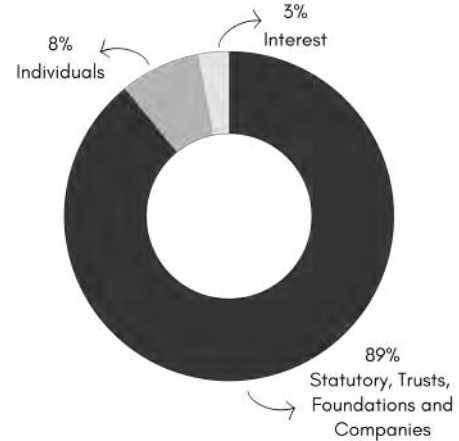

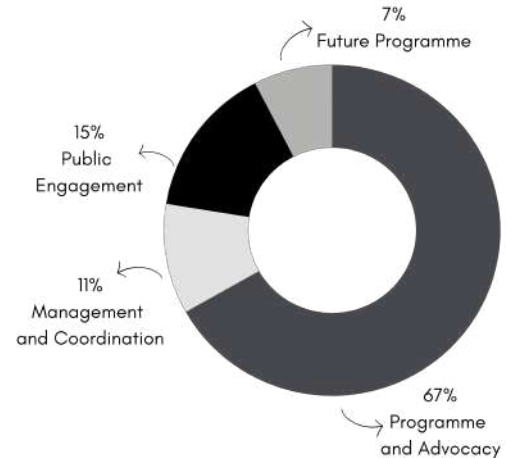
